LENTEN CANDLE LITURGY:

During the season of Lent, we remember and retell the story of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. He came bringing light and love, assurance and amazing grace. But there were those who were shut down by the shadows of fear, or reshaped by a desire for power, with hearts that were shrunken and shrivelled up. They sought to extinguish the light and exclude the love that brings life.

We remember from Matthew's Gospel the heartbreaking story of Jesus telling his disciples of what was to come. "In two days," he said, "it will be, as you know, the Passover Festival, and the Son of Man will be handed over to be crucified." In the meantime, the elders and chief priests were meeting with Caiaphas the High

Priest in his palace. They plotted to secretly arrest Jesus and have him executed. Their thinking was that they shouldn't do it during the festival because there would likely be a riot, and the Romans would clamp down even harder. But to their surprise and no doubt delight, one of the disciples, one of the twelve who were closest to Jesus, Judas Iscariot, came to them. He asked what they would give him if he betrayed his teacher to them. They gave him thirty silver coins, and from then on, he looked for his chance. The intimacy of a kiss, the emptiness of a troubled heart, the overwhelming doubt that led to despair and to death... in those tense and troubled times, in those days of anxiousness and joyless desperation, of human hardship and frailty... it could have been anybody really... For a moment the glint of the silver in a man's hand seemed to be the only light that mattered.

We know that the lovelight will always be raised up, it will rise over every new horizon, and we know that it will never be overcome. And yet, in such places, in too many places still, the presence of the light within and among all was dimmed for a while...



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SCRIPTURE READINGS – New International Version

Isaiah 43:16-21

- This is what the LORD says he who made a way through the sea, a path through the mighty waters,
- **17** who drew out the chariots and horses, the army and reinforcements together, and they lay there, never to rise again, extinguished, snuffed out like a wick:
- "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past.
- See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?

I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.

The wild animals honour me, the jackals and the owls, because I provide water in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland,

to give drink to my people, my chosen,

the people I formed for myself that they may proclaim my praise.

Philippians 3:4-14

- If someone else thinks they have reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more:
- circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee;
- as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for righteousness based on the law, faultless.
- But whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ.
- What is more, I consider everything a loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them garbage, that I may gain Christ
- and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ the righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith.

- I want to know Christ yes, to know the power of his resurrection and participation in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death,
- and so, somehow, attaining to the resurrection from the dead.
- Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me.
- Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead,
- I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus.

John 12:1-8

- Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus lived, whom Jesus had raised from the dead.
- **2** Here a dinner was given in Jesus' honour. Martha served, while Lazarus was among those reclining at the table with him.
- **3** Then Mary took about a pint of pure nard, an expensive perfume; she poured it on Jesus' feet and wiped his feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.
- But one of his disciples, Judas Iscariot, who was later to betray him, objected,
- "Why wasn't this perfume sold and the money given to the poor? It was worth a year's wages."
- He did not say this because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; as keeper of the money bag, he used to help himself to what was put into it.
- **7** "Leave her alone," Jesus replied. "It was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of my burial.
- You will always have the poor among you, but you will not always have me."
